Specialised Curriculum

All Year 7 students will take part in a carefully crafted curriculum that encompasses traditional academic subjects such as English, Maths and Science taught by our specialist teachers plus a range of cross curricular learning experiences.

The key to success is careful assessment when the children arrive at President Kennedy School which enables us to identify strengths and areas of development early. We then devise highly personalised timetables for each student based on their particular needs to make sure that every child is stretched to reach their full potential.

Students are placed in sets according to their ability in English and Maths to maximise progress and learning outcomes.

Students who arrive below national average in key subjects such as English and Maths are often offered additional lessons such as our Fresh Start & Guided Reading Programme in small groups which give them just the boost they need.

The Bridge boasts an experienced team who are all educational professionals dedicated to the Year 7 students in their care. The Bridge is led by Miss Tovey, Leader of the Bridge, who has many years experience in school leading and developing Year 7 students. There is also a Bridge Pastoral Leader who specialises in the Pastoral Care of 11-12 year olds.

The Bridge staff are always on hand to answer questions and ensure the students feel secure and happy. The team is greatly enhanced by a full time literacy specialist, Miss Griffin, and several numeracy teachers who assess children's ability, monitor progress and organise additional lessons which increase attainment in these important subjects. There is also a strong team of Bridge teaching assistants who specialise in supporting Year 7s.

Parents and Carers

At every stage of our Transition Programme we go out of our way to meet and engage with prospective parents and carers. This is important to us for two reasons. Firstly, parents and carers are a vital source of information and this input helps us understand the individual needs of children early on. Secondly, parents and carers are an essential part of the process of education. We know that close relationships between parents/carers and our staff greatly enhances the success of your child through their time at President Kennedy School. Year 7 Parents are invited to join a Parental Partnership group to provide us with continual feedback and ideas for improvement. We also offer regular events where parents can join us and learn alongside their child.



Making the Grade ... At GCSE and A Level



Another set of outstanding GCSE results in 2023.

Last year, the school again achieved excellent examination results at A Level and GCSE, well above city and national averages. In 2023, President Kennedy School's GCSE results remained very strong with 66% of our students achieving the important measure of Grade 4 - 9 in both English and Maths. Based on these results, President Kennedy School will again be one of the top performing schools across the city and nationally for academic progress.



"Students achieve exceptionally well and above national averages by the end of Key Stage 4.

The progress that students make in English and Mathematics is much better than the progress of students in most schools." Ofsted

At A-Level, across all subjects, 21% of our students achieved the very top grade of A* or Distinction*.

The average grade achieved by students studying vocational courses was Distinction* which is an outstanding achievement. The vast majority of our Post 16 leavers achieved their first choice place at university or secured a place on an apprenticeship.

In Year 13, this year 91% of our students achieved their first-choice university or apprenticeship, with 86% of our students attending the top 50 universities in the country, including Harvard and Oxford.

On Wednesday 30th November, President Kennedy School was privileged to welcome Holocaust Survivor Professor Peter Lantos to the school to film a short piece that will be aired on the **BBC One Show** in late January. As part of the Echo

Eternal Project that the school have been engaged with since 2017, the school was gifted the testimony of Peter that was transcribed from an interview with journalist Natasha Kaplinsky.

Peter was transported to Bergen-Belsen Concentration Camp as a young child and repeated the journey after retiring from his role leading research in Neuroscience at King's College. As part of a creative arts piece, supported by the Royal Conservatoire in Birmingham, students created a film that can be seen on YouTube entitled '*Make the Best out of the Worst*', based on their engagement with Peter's testimony.

The school also, as part of a 'Sharing Pledge' within the Echo Eternal Project, created an 'Echo Eternal Curriculum Garden' in memory and celebration of Peter's testimony and prison number at Bergen-Belsen, 8431.

The design and planning of the garden was centred on elements of Peter's testimony, the centrepiece of which is a Cherry tree that Peter remembers in his garden as a child.

Hays Education, who sponsored the Echo Eternal Project, gifted the tree to the school and it was planted in the Summer of 2022 by Peter and President Kennedy School Gardener Rob Bromfield. Rob and Peter have since become friends and correspond regularly, sharing the progress of the garden through the seasons.

the visit on the 30th November was organised by the book publisher, Scholastic. Peter wrote his first book, Parallel Lines: A Journey from Childhood to Belsen in 2006. In January 2023, Peter, in association with Scholastic, is publishing a child's version, '*The Boy who Didn't Want to Die'*. The book describes an extraordinary journey, made by Peter, a boy of five, through war-torn Europe in 1944 and 1945. Peter and his parents set out from a small Hungarian town, travelling through Austria and then Germany together. Along the way, unforgettable images of adventure flash one after another: sleeping in a tent and then

under the sky, discovering a disused brick factory, catching butterflies in the meadows - and as Peter realises that this adventure is really a nightmare - watching bombs falling from the blue sky outside Vienna and learning maths from his mother in Belsen. All this is drawn against a background of terror, starvation, infection and, inevitably, death, before Peter and his mother can return home.

On his visit to President Kennedy School, Peter read to Year 7 students and answered questions. He was then reunited with Lily Marsden and Erin Ford from Year 12, who participated in the original project when they were in Year 8 and met Peter in the summer. Peter then chatted with Rob and toured the garden, all filmed for the *BBC One Show*.

The date when the film will be aired will be communicated with the school community once confirmed by the BBC, however, it is intended that this will be on Holocaust Memorial Day on Friday 27th January 2023. Watch this space......!

PKS Students Meet Madagascan Students Live on Teams

A group of Year 8 students had the opportunity to speak to students from a local school in the Madagascan town of Mananjary. This was made possible through our links with the charity organisation Khalsa Aid.

Madagascar is in the midst of an emergency-level food crisis. The country has regularly been the victim of natural disasters but, following years of harsh weather conditions, June 2021 brought the worst drought in 40 years. This has devastated the yield of crops in the southern region, subjected 1.2 million people to food insecurities and 400,000 more in a critical state of famine.

Khalsa Aid were back in the coastal town of Mananjary after it was largely destroyed by two topical cyclones. This November Khalsa Aid delivered vital assistance. The purpose of the was to be able to deliver essential food products to families throughout the South. They are distributing to more than 200 families per day, providing each with resources to sustain them for at least 2 weeks. They are solely purchasing from local suppliers in a deliberate effort to support the local economy and farming trade. Both of these industries have suffered greatly at the hands of the climate change and Covid-19 pandemic.

President Kennedy School students were greeted with a smile and gained much from the experience. Our students learned that children in Madagascar have up to 50 children per class and of mixed age range. Due to the number of students and the lack of facilities and classrooms they run two sessions. Meaning children often attend one session some attending in the morning and others in the afternoon. Children are not taught English, and their main spoken language is French.

Students also learned that Madagascan children do not have the same opportunities as them simply because they do not have the resources for extracurricular activities.

I would like to thank Khalsa Aid for all the hard work they do and to Marcus Lapsa who gave our students the opportunity to meet and share their experiences with the children of Madagascar.

Visit to Pinewood Studios

The Year 10 Media Studies cohort discovered the inner workings of the film industry last week, on an exciting trip to the 'Futures Festival' at Pinewood Studios. Sherbourne Fields History Project

"The Sherbourne Fields History Project I presume"

"If we could, we would give them a job" These were the words of a teacher from Sherbourne Fields Special School about a group of President Kennedy School students. It was a reference to the skill, the empathy and the sense of purpose they demonstrated during 2 very different school days which have left them with some wonderful memories.

The event in question was the return of the hugely popular and successful History Project at Sherbourne Fields Special School, which has lit up the summer term for groups of Year 9 President Kennedy School students for a generation.

It was an "*Empire into Commonwealth*" theme this year. In brightly-coloured period costume, our Year 9 students arrived with an array of props and ideas ready to deliver. The result was great fun! For 2 days we helped to inform, entertain and educate Key Stage 3 students at Sherbourne.

For the students at Sherbourne Fields, there is always something special about new groups of young people who visit and support them. They thrive on the spirit and energy of our students. For our own students there was a different sort of challenge; finding the confidence, ideas and personality to appreciate the individual needs of a wider society and help them participate and enjoy history.

This does not come without great effort and preparation. The group worked extremely hard in the weeks before the project to prepare stories and resources to help the young people they were waiting to meet. The team gave up lots of their own time to engage with this process; they developed their own distinct costumes, from Queen Victoria to a lion! They also worked on their own versions of classic tales of Empire, resistance and increased multicultural awareness.

There was ample opportunity to appreciate and share the customs, artwork, music and dance that has enriched our lives.

The sensory nature of learning at Sherbourne Fields was something our students were able to quickly adapt to. In a reworking of the classic Empire tale of Stanley's search for Livingstone in the African wilderness, students had to identify the sounds of the jungle. In looking at the establishment of Australia as a penal colony, they were introduced to physical nature of work and punishment on the prison ship and on the chain gang. This included teaching sea shanties to the Sherbourne students.

We also attempted to demonstrate the transition from Empire to Commonwealth, covering famous protests against the British Empire such as Gandhi's salt tax protest in India.

As in previous years, our Year 9 students were impressed with Sherbourne Fields, the change in routine it provided them with and the opportunity to meet new people and have greater responsibility for their own learning.

Reflecting on her own experiences, Shanice Rogers said "*it was* such a beautiful experience. I would go back any time as it was such a burst of joy to work with those people."

Alex, Melissa and Lucy were also still buzzing from the experience. They spoke of the *"friendships and connections"* they had made and felt they had proved they *"had the skills that are needed to work successfully with children in the future."*

They also recognised that they had "overcome their own embarrassment" and proved they could present, re-enact and entertain others without any fear of looking silly. This was huge confidence builder for the whole group and a perfect preparation for the challenges of GCSE.






Our Outcomes


Back at camp, food was cooked and rapidly consumed before washing lines were constructed to utilise the last of the day's


