Pride Recognition Awards

On Wednesday morning a whole school assembly was held focusing on the topic of PRIDE. PRIDE is at the very core of what we believe here at President Kennedy School for all staff and students alike.

Ms Rooke was impressed with the many and varied contributions from students during tutor time with their comprehensive understanding of what PRIDE meant to them. Comments included:

Taking pride in their uniform, behaviour and being respectful to all, showing acts of kindness, having a growth mind set, a determination to succeed, being an ambassador of their community, engaging in lessons and keeping their environment clean and tidy.

Issues raised in order to maintain our high standards included: wearing blazers, not running on site, keeping

to our strict guidelines regarding the school uniform, not wearing ear pods or using mobile phones in school, sitting down to eat and having intelligent, grown up conversations surrounding any issues that may arise.

Ms Rooke also launched a new incentive: *The Pride Recognition Rewards*.

Tips on Social Media...

What should I know about online privacy?

Students have been learning about online safety this week in the tutor curriculum - please read these top tips on how we can all ensure that we are keeping safe.

Most social media websites have privacy policies and settings, but they are all different. Some sites are completely public, meaning that anyone can read or look at anything, anytime. Other sites let you control who has access to your information.

The following suggestions will help you and your children protect their online privacy:

- · Read a website's privacy policy before sharing any personal information.
- Check your child's privacy policy settings to make sure they aren't sharing more information than you want (for example, their birthdate or location).
- If they use a GPS-enabled smartphone or tablet, they could be posting status updates, photos and videos with "geotags".
 Geotags share the exact location of where your photo was taken. Make sure these are turned off on devices.
- Encourage your child to use an online nickname, instead of a real name, whenever possible.
- Make sure your child keeps every account password protected, and have them change passwords often. Remind your child not to share passwords, even with friends.
- Your child should not accept friend requests from (or actively connect with) people they don't know in real life.
- · Explain that Snapchat posts are NOT temporary, as they were intended to be.
- People can take screenshots of a photo before it disappears.
- Encourage them to protect and respect their friends' privacy too. They should ask permission before posting something about a friend, such as a photo or a video. They should also be aware of what your friends are posting about them.
