


Orange Mint looks and smells sensational.....

So much lush green growth and the aroma is amazing!




Eryngium [Sea Holly] is an absolute bee magnet..


More Bee Activity on our Sea Holly.....

Banana plants produce some stunning leaves as they unfurl up from the middle of the plant – wrapped tight, given plenty of water and sunshine the produce some amazing colours from the leaves.....

Summer is a busy time in the garden.....

Despite the very unpredictable summer weather we have experienced so far through, June and July there are still plenty of crops growing, some perhaps not as advanced as they should be, but nature has a way of catching up, not unlike last summer when we had the extreme heat at the start of the summer which slowed down lots of crops, and then the second half of the summer almost into early Autumn crops produced almost a second wave of growth and production. Below you can see our runner beans that have produced lots of flowers but as yet no beans.....

Here you can see another variety of Runner Beans that we are growing......

This variety is pot grown and is called Hestia......

They produce plenty of Runner Beans off dwarf plants, usually a heavy cropper too, given plenty of water and sunshine.....

Here you can just see the small beans are starting to form, so hopefully we will be able to harvest some fresh, tasty beans very soon indeed.....

The big growing bed that is planted with Lavender in the garden has been in flower for a few weeks now proving to be an absolute haven for many different types of pollinators including bees and butterflies..... Pollinators are essential to the balance of nature and the eco-system...... Without the pollinators, there are many fruits and vegetables that we would not be able to enjoy so we need to create a pollinator friendly environment......

We have had a huge crop of tomatoes in the poly tunnel, despite the up and down weather, all of the different varieties that we have grown have cropped very heavily. The different varieties as you can see are not only different shapes and sizes but also they have provided a rich array of colours too – trust me, home grown tomatoes straight off the vine have a marvellous taste

Verbena Bonariensis are so pollinator friendly.....

We are always striving to provide lots of pollinator friendly plants and flowers in our allotment – garden areas. One such plant is highlighted here, verbena bonariensis is growing all over our allotment area, a plant that will grow in most conditions, indeed it will readily self – seed into cracks in tarmac and concrete, almost anywhere. It stands tall in the wind and it will flower endlessly through all conditions.....



Our pollinators are so important in our allotment and garden areas.....

They are absolutely crucial to our food production.....

At least a third of our food relies on the pollinators to produce this food......

Rainbow Chard and Beet Leaf.....

Here you can see a bed of Rainbow Chard and Beet Leaf that has produced some really vibrant leaf – the colours are so vivid. They taste good too.....



Fennel is standing tall.....

Fennel is a beautiful striking herb that is standing tall with some beautiful flowers, fennel flowers have plenty of medicinal properties...... Likewise fennel seeds have many, many different properties too......



Calendula is so bright and colourful.....

Yet another herb that grows readily in our allotment – garden and another herb that has many culinary and medicinal properties...... Calendula readily self - seeds, indeed it is relatively easy to grow too......
