
After a successful internship with the BBC last summer, Caidie now works as a Finance Co-ordinator for the Content Investment department of BBC Studios, handling the financial, legal and operational side of television production investments of up to £100,000!

Caidie's presentation covered the values, funding model and scope of the corporation, which was not only fascinating, but also helped to deepen students' knowledge of the television and radio industries which feature on their GCSE course. We also got to hear about some amazing opportunities Caidie has had since starting with the BBC, including seeing celebrities and visiting famous television sets. Former Student Talks about Degree Apprenticeships



On Wednesday 8th November Post 16 held an information session on Degree Apprenticeships ran by one of our former students, Nasim Sherif.

Nasim is currently studying for an Apprenticeship degree with DHL. Degree apprenticeships are a type of apprenticeship programme which allows students to earn a full bachelor's degree. They combine working for an employer in a professional environment with part-time study at a university.

Just like other types of apprenticeship, there are no tuition fees and you'll be paid a wage. This means that you could achieve a full bachelor's degree without any student debt.

Degree apprenticeships are extremely competitive, so Nasim came in to speak with Post 16 students to share his insights on how to apply for these courses. Post 16 students found his experiences and advice invaluable, and we hope to invite Nasim back later this year as part of our Alumni programme to guide students with their applications.

MANAGING ANXIETY AROUND SCHOOL

School is a place where young people often experience anxiety for several reasons. Some people may worry about making friends or fitting in, have difficulty understanding school work, or feeling exam pressure.

School-Related Anxiety Warning Signs:

- Not sleeping well
- Feeling sick or complaining of butterflies in their stomach
- Not wanting to get out of bed in the morning
 - Not wanting to get out of bed in the morning Increased anger or upset at school or home

It is common that young people show symptoms of school-related anxiety in evenings or early mornings before school. The first step to supporting your child is to understand what is causing these feelings.

Top tip: Some children may find it difficult to be asked direct questions about their feelings. Try creating a mind map with them about school, including everything that is on their mind.

Strategies to Try at Home:

Keep a record of patterns in behaviours to share with the school's Mental Health Lead

Create a self-soothe box with Items that your child finds relaxing Breathing exercises Create a morning routine Recognise small achievements People at our heart
