






Year 9 Experience Auschwitz-Birkenau




















On Monday 29th January, Year 9 students were invited to watch a video guided tour of Auschwitz-Birkenau. As the 27th January was Holocaust Memorial Day, this provided an opportunity for students to reflect on the atrocities that occurred across Europe.

Students showed real empathy as they watched a tour of the site itself and the museum now within it, providing them with insightful knowledge for their studies of Nazi Germany in Year 9 and GCSE History. The Humanities department will be taking GCSE and A level students to Krakow in March to visit Auschwitz as well as Oskar Schindler's factory and the Galicia Jewish Museum.
