- → Life skills


Missed days in school can have a significant impact on all the above.

The Adjusters by Andrew Taylor

When 14-year-old Henry's mum loses her job, they are forced to move to Newton County - a small American town where everyone seems just a little bit too perfect... While Henry's mother settles into her new job at the Malcorp Complex that dominates the town, Henry finds himself at odds with the strange, conformist world that Malcorp's owner, John Mallory, has created. At school, the students around Henry are all superintelligent and physically powerful, but eerily detached and totally respectful of all authority. As his suspicions grow about Newton's "special education" program, Henry breaks into the Malcorp medical centre with his two misfit friends, searching for answers. But none of them could have ever imagined what they'd find behind the closed Malcorp doors.

Cymbeline Igloo is bored. Bored of home learning, bored of lockdown, bored of not being able to do anything. And to make things even worse, his mum accidentally gave away his favourite football shirt.
