Echo Eternal - Students Pay a Moving Tribute












A group of 13 year 8 pupils have been working with *Echo Eternal* to create a commemorative art piece to perform on Friday 18th November. The pupils are using the testimony of Holocaust survivor Peter Lantos. Peter has worked closely with the school for a number of years and has kindly gifted us his testimony as an important piece of history to help students understand what happened during the Holocaust.

The pupils have studied Peter's testimony to find parts that have resonated with them and have represented this through puppetry and other theatrical mediums in their performance. The pupils performance will 'echo' the testimony to pay tribute to Peter and all of the victims of the Holocaust.

The parents of our Year 7 High Attainer students were invited to attend a parents evening on Wednesday 2nd November, alongside their child. This was an incredibly powerful evening that saw parents and their children come together in a classroom setting to learn and to approach a range of challenging activities, and to increase awareness of strategies that parents can use at home.

The evening started with a presentation in the hall where parents were given an insight into the provision given to high attainer students both in the classroom and beyond the curriculum. Parents were then invited into classrooms within the Bridge, as part of a carousel, where they were given some challenging tasks to complete alongside

their child, in three different and varied subject areas. In English, students were asked to verbally contribute to a number of talking points using sophisticated and formal language, using no banned words. In Science, students were invited to think critically about the use of fossil fuels and renewable energy. In History, students were exposed to a range of activities that would stretch and deepen their thinking through an array of historical sources.

All students were incredibly engaged during this event, and it was a sheer joy to have parents back through our doors again! A huge thank you to all students in Year 7 and their parents who attended!'

Managing Screen Time

Crowfall by Vashti Hardy

A young boy sets out to save his technology-dependent island home from destruction at the hands of a corrupt leadership. Cast out from the clockwork island of Ironhold, where mechanical technology controls everything, Orin Crowfall finds himself adrift on a small boat in the middle of the ocean. As Orin and his robot friend Cody struggle to make sense of the events that brought them here, the one thing they know for sure is that Ironhold is in trouble. They need to get back, whatever the cost. Plagued by perilous seas and freak storms, and with a terrifying sea monster on their tail, Orin soon realises their journey won't be easy. It will take courage and strength, trusting in new friends and embracing the spirit of adventure, if Orin wants to save his home.



Call it What You Want by Brigid Kemmerer

Two troubled teenagers develop a friendship when they are paired together for a school project. Rob had it all friends, a near-guaranteed lacrosse scholarship to college and an amazing family - but all that changed when his dad was caught embezzling funds from half the town. Now he's a social pariah. Maegan always does the right thing. But when her sister comes home from college pregnant, she's caught between telling their parents the truth about the father and keeping her sister's trust. When Rob and Maegan are paired together for a project, they form an unexpectedly deep connection. But Rob's plan to fix his father's damage could ruin more than their new friendship.
